Portrait of a killer—but is he Zodiac?

SANTA ROSA—He is a loner, a man in his early 30s with a history of mental instability. A man who enjoyed torturing animals as a child, a man who had a weak father, whom he hated. A man who regards women as garbage. This is the description of the single assailant now believed responsible for the deaths of five Sonoma County girls—and presumably seven?

He is also responsible for the three other deaths in the Western States!

By a well-publicized news conference, Sheriff Don Strupke said his office now believes that indeed a single assailant is responsible for the deaths of six young women whose bodies were found dumped along county roads from March 1973 to December 1974.

As for the six with deaths in those parts of California and in Washington, Utah, New Mexico and Colorado, the sheriff says there are many similarities, but he left it at that.

At 50 reporters and television cameramen later—some from lecture halls, some from curbside—Strupke outlined the "psychological profile" of the assailant, who apparently went so far as to "interview" his prospective victims before killing them, and then dumped their bodies along roadsides and creeksides like so much "garbage."

Strupke appeared to anyone who might have knowledge of a man fitting the description to contact his office (707) 452-8701, or, if they wish to remain anonymous, to use the Secret Witness program.

To use the Secret Witness program, forward information to Sheriff Wilson, PO Box 105, Ukiah. At the time you forward a copy of a page, and also the main part of the letter near three of the Sonoma County victims.

He explained the similarities those killed in Sonoma County: all were young women, all were killed in a place other than the one in which they were found, and all had been "loved" great distances.

Strupke said it was the "gut feeling" of the department that the individual was in his early 30s. He is considered to be in the information leads to an arrest or conviction. A \$100,000 reward will be made through the media.

Besides the Secret Witness reward, another \$100,000 reward has been offered by the Sacramento Bee.

At talk of Jack the Ripper and the Boston Strangler, Strupke through reporter's questions, Strupke noted before a map of the Western States and a "victim" symbol found a number of San Francisco area deaths, in some of the same areas as the Sonoma County slayings.

Vietnam—Where do we stand?

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Indochina War ended as no other military conflict has, with 116,000 American troops evacuated by helicopter, with gun-toting Marines to protest the evacuation of the South Vietnamese, and the rest left behind.

There are no triumphs in Times Square, no ticker tape parades, no triumphant homecomings.

The triumph was left to the Communists and their allies, who had been fighting for 20 years against the French, the Americans and the South Vietnamese associated with these foreigners.

Babylift suit filed

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — A federal court suit contends many of the children born out of South Vietnam abducted and held for ransom in the U.S. military intervention.

The suit was filed in the District Court Tuesday by Michael McCann, a nurse who is the guardian of four Vietnamese children.

The defendants in the suit include Secretary of State Henry Kissinger and Attorney General Edward Levi.

Cobb geothermal lease offered to Lake board
