

**City Scientist
Helps Police
With Identity**

Autopsy results confirmed the remains of a surgically dissected body of a woman found earlier this month in Oklahoma City have revealed new clues to her identity, police said Wednesday.

Detective Sgt. Larry Upchurch said the dead woman was white, probably with Indian ancestry, 5 feet 2 or 3 feet 3 and between 18 and 27 years old, which is much younger than investigators originally believed.

Police said initial medical tests showed the victim to be between 25 and 26 years old.

Chapelin Bark Upchurch said efforts of state medical examiner Dr. A. Jay Chapman and Federal Aviation Administration anthropologist Dr. Clyde Snow also showed the woman had been dark complexioned, with dark curly hair, and had probably never given birth.

Dental and latential tests revealed the woman possibly could have come from a lower economic background. However, investigators stressed this was speculation and by no means conclusive.

Call received in a rushed development, Upchurch said that at the start of detective search for the victim's identity, he received a phone call from a woman who told of an Oklahoma City family of which the dead woman might be a member.

She said the mother was a South American who had apparently returned to South America recently; that the father was a member of the Air Force, retired from Tinker Air Force Base, and that the couple had two daughters in their late teens and a son who could be living in Oklahoma City at the present time.

News lost Upchurch said he recorded the information along with the caller's name and phone number, but gave little notice at the time police called they were looking for a much older woman.

In the interim, Upchurch said the caller's name has been lost. He asked, in light of new developments, that the woman please call him.

Police stressed the importance of this call in helping develop leads to the identity of the dead woman and the arrest and conviction of her killer.

The woman's body was found April 11 in the living room of an abandoned house at 205 N.E. 5 by three oil field workers employed at a nearby drilling site.

**School's Well
To Be Tested**

REMINISCENCE—A county-wide health team will examine a school water well Thursday to determine if it has been the source of a recent outbreak of sickness which has affected scores of students at a small rural community school near here.

Mark Roberts, a state health department epidemiologist, said in Oklahoma City that an on-site inspection will be conducted by health officials from both Seminole County and the state.

James Stratfield, superintendent of the Prairie Valley grade school at Sutherland, northeast of here, said there had been a high absence rate among the 200 students and 15 staff members in late March.
