More Body Parts Found; Discovery Downplayed

Oklahoma City police Tuesday recovered more body parts belonging to a 22-year-old slaying victim not far from where the victim's head was found nearly two weeks ago.

Mrs. Killian's severed head was found April 19 about three blocks away in the 1100 block of N. Central.

Despite the find, Andrews and homicide Sgt. Mike Heath indicated discovery of more body parts is not crucial to the investigation.

The partially decomposed remains, identified as those of Arley Bell Killian, were found in an alley about 11 a.m. in the 400 block of N. Walnut, detective Larry Andrews said.

The leg and torso, dissected at the shoulders and at the bottom of the rib cage, were found about 10 feet from each other in high grass, Andrews said. More remains of the pelvis were found 40 feet away in another part of the lot, he said.

The woman's left leg, torso and portions of her pelvis were discovered on the ground by two women who were searching the lot for salvageable cans, Andrews said.
