A West Philadelphia man who was released Wednesday after being charged with the stabbing death of a vagrant at 13th and Race Sts. last April has been charged with the overnight stabbing deaths of two men found lying in doorways in the same area.

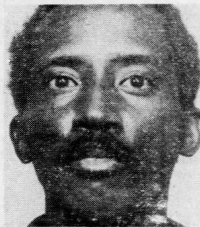
Norris Little, 33, was picked up by police shortly before 4 a.m. today on a center city street corner after police recalled his involvement with the April murder.

LAST NIGHT'S victims have been tentatively identified as Edward Foczewa, 27, and Joseph McGurk, 77.

Foczewa, of Emerald St. near Ontario, Kensington, was found at 10:45 p.m. lying in a door on the 1200 block of Spring St. Forty minutes later, McGurk, of 9th St. near Race, was found lying in a doorway on the 1200 block of Race St.

Both men were stabbed several times in the chest. They were pronounced dead on arrival at Hahnemann Hospital.

The doorway where McGurk was found is just a few doors away from St. John's Hospice For Men, 1221 Race St., a charitable organization that tends to the needs of down-and-out-

ers.

ON APRIL 5, Kenneth Moore, 54, a vagrant from Baltimore, Md., was found dead at 13th and Race Sts. He had been lying on a steam grating, apparently to keep warm, when he was attacked. Police said Moore was stabbed twice in the chest.

Two other stabbings occurred in the area within a little more than 24

hours after Moore's murder. On April 7, Little, of Westminster St. near 41st was arrested in the area of the stabbings and charged with criminal attempt murder. He was held in \$15,000 bail and committed to the Detention Center.

On April 12, Little was charged with Moore's murder.

Last Wednesday, Little was taken from the Detention Center to appear before Common Pleas Court Judge Armand Della Porta on a motion to quash the murder charge.

It was not immediately known what transpired at the hearing, but Little was released.

FOLLOWING last night's murders, homicide detectives remembered Little's release, and issued a police radio message to pick him up for questioning. Shortly before 4 a.m., uniform police spotted Little standing on the corner of 10th and Ludlow Sts.

Police feel last night's murder was committed with a small knife, and do not think robbery was a motive. The weapon has not yet been recovered.

City Asks Silencing Of WDAS

City Solicitor Sheldon L. Albert wants the Federal Communications Commission to lift the license of black-oriented radio station WDAS because of the station's programming during the recent racial tension in Southwest Philadelphia.

In a letter to FCC Chairman Charles D. Ferris dated June 22, Albert charged the station with programming that is "compellingly racist, inflammatory and detrimental to the well-being of the city." He accused the station of broadcasting "blatantly provocative statements."

"IT IS EXTREMELY likely that if more violence erupts, it will be the direct result of the irresponsibility of the station," Albert wrote. He requested the FCC to listen to station tapes and decide whether WDAS "has forfeited its right to broadcast on the public airwaves."

Cody Anderson, assistant general manager of WDAS, said yesterday he had not seen the letter and could not comment.

In a separate interview, Albert said he was especially upset by statements made by State Rep. Milton Street on the station last week urging blacks to apply for gun registrations.

"THEY HAVE A lack of responsibility," Albert claimed. "Their policy is to let anybody use their airwaves to say anything they want."

Albert was unclear on whether his letter had been discussed with Mayor Rizzo and reflected the mayor's feelings. "What probably occurred is

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State Rep. Cianciulli Indicted in Vote Fraud

State Rep. Matthew Cianciulli Jr. and more than 20 of his South Philadelphia constituents today were indicted by a Federal grand jury on vote fraud charges.

The indictment was returned to U.S. District Judge John B. Hannum shortly after 2 p.m., and details were not immediately available.

However, it was learned that one of those indicted was a Philadelphia police officer.

The indictment generally charged that the defendants registered under aliases or either registered or voted illegally in elections in Philadelphia since 1976.

CIANCIULLI, 35, a Democrat, won the 183d legislative district seat in a special election in April 1976, and re-election that November.

His Republican opponent, Frank DiCiccio, had challenged Cianciulli's claim of residency, alleging that Cianciulli did not live at 1427 S. Sixth St. but instead at 201 Cedar Lake

Drive in Collings Lake, N.J.

Although Cianciulli admitted that he and his wife owned the New Jersey property and that his two children had attended schools in Collings Lake for years, the Philadelphia city commissioners refused to strike his South Philadelphia voter registration as improper.

Cianciulli was cited in a 1977 State Crime Commission report on that election which said 38 percent of the votes cast in his 48th Ward, Ninth Division, were phony.

OF 582 VOTES, 159 were cast by fictitious persons or persons with phony addresses — including Amos n Andy, Milton Shapp and Nikita Khrushchev (sic).

The commission said 20 persons were registered at the home owned by Cianciulli's mother.

Cianciulli, however, denied any responsibility and said "at one time or another, those people did live there..."

Last November, Cianciulli easily won re-election to his legislative seat.

Cops Have No Clues In Teacher's Murder

Despite an "intensive investigation," State Police have come up with nothing substantial in the murder case of Susan Reinert, a 36-year-old Ardmore, Montgomery County, woman found in the trunk of a car in Harrisburg Monday.

Nor do police have any leads on the whereabouts of Reinert's two children.

"WE HAVE AN intensive investigation surrounding both the death of Mrs. Reinert and the disappearance of her two children," said Lt. Herman Faiola of the State Police Criminal Investigation Unit in Harrisburg yesterday.

The body of Reinert, a former Upper Merion High School English teacher, was discovered at 5:30 a.m. Monday inside the open hatchback of her Plymouth Horizon parked at the Host Inn, a large convention-center motel 3 miles from the Pennsylvania Turnpike's Harrisburg interchange. She had been beaten and smothered. Police said an anonymous adult

male voice "was very brief" over the phone when telling a radio dispatcher that the body was in a parked car in the motel lot.

REINERT'S DAUGHTER, Karen, 11, and her son, Michael, 10, still are missing. Neighbors told police they last saw the mother and two children Friday evening outside her Woodcrest Ave. home.

Faiola said police had checked with Reinert's brother, Patrick Gallagher, in Pittsburgh, to see if he knew anyone with whom she might have left the children before her death, but neither Gallagher nor any of the woman's Ardmore friends or neighbors knows of the children's whereabouts.

SEVERAL INVESTIGATORS said yesterday they were not optimistic of finding the children alive, theorizing that if anyone were babysitting the children they would have called police by now — or that if anyone were holding the children for ransom, a member of the family would have been notified.
