More suits and arrests in tax drive

The Green administration's roundup of delinquent taxes had yesterday to 117 more lawsuits and 11 more arrests, and city officials said the arrests of other tax delinquents were being forwarded to the prosecutor's office.

In getting phone calls from the public, lawyers began to get on the line, and Ted McVey, deputy city manager, said a lot of people have been called. Many more have been called in the paper, what can be said.

City attorneys went to Common Pleas Court to file the same against 177 businesses and individuals in the city. The suits are for back taxes and wage taxes. The suits are in addition to 176 more filed last week by Municipal and Common Pleas courts.

At the same time, sheriff's deputies arrested 11 more persons for failure to pay court fines that had already been imposed on them for failing to

pay back business taxes. Eight persons had been arrested on similar charges Friday.

Chief Inspector Joseph Crotolan of the sheriff's office said that those arrested were being given the option of paying the fines or going to jail. He could not provide a breakdown of the outcome of yesterday's cases.

McVey said that only those who had already been found in arrears on court fines and had been fined could be arrested. Persons simply charged with failure to pay taxes would have to be brought to the city with fines to be paid.
