Police search for missing pair

Man, girl sought in wilderness

ISLE OF WIGHT — Police are searching for a 20-year-old man and a 14-year-old girl from the Peninsula who apparently disappeared from the Ragged Island game preserve at the southern end of the James River Bridge early Sunday.

Members of the Sheriff's Department, State Police and the state game commission searched the wilderness area late Tuesday after the man and girl had not been seen since about midnight Saturday.

Missing are David Knobling of the first block of Sankin Lake Drive, Hampton, and Robin M. Edwards of the 600 block of Willow Drive, Newport News, according to Deputy Joey Willard.

Willard said he found a pickup truck belonging to Knobling on Monday morning, just after midnight, with the keys in the ignition, the radio playing and items of clothing on the seat along with Knobling's wallet.

Bonnie Edwards, the girl's mother, entered a missing person's report Monday with the Newport News Police Department, Willard said.

The search will resume today, Willard said.

Officers searched the brush and those involved in criminal or legal proceedings. Patents will have a structured day, but they are not confined against their will," he said.

Bonnie Edwards told Willard she last saw her daughter about 11:30 p.m. Saturday when she was returning from a movie date with Knobling's cousin. About 5:30 a.m. Sunday, the girl's father found the front door open and Robin was missing.

Willard said the family reported that the girl has a history of running away from home.

Knobling's mother said she last saw him early Sunday shortly after midnight, Willard said.

Sheriff B. F. Dixon reported he saw the truck at the Ragged Island parking lot early Sunday with the driver's door open, the deputy added.

The search will resume today, Willard said.

Roof repairs OK'd

POQUOSON — The high school will get roof repairs on Tuesday to give the board a revenue windfall in the School Board's budget.

Airport parking lot plan expands

NEWPORT NEWS — An optimistic Peninsula Airport Commission added \$100,000 Tuesday in its plan to triple the number of parking spaces at Patrick Henry International Airport.

The money, which includes \$22,833 in state entitlement funds, brings the parking lot expansion to more than \$430,000, said Peter B. Dalton, executive director of the airport.

The money will be partially made up by a \$1 increase in parking fees, starting Nov. 20. It will cost \$3.50 per day to park at Patrick Henry, up from \$2.50 a day now.

"We are actively pursuing key carrier service to the South and to New York. Once that service comes into place, we're going to be at capacity automatically," Dalton said.

Planning for a bigger parking lot now will meet the airport's needs later, Dalton said. With the expansion in carrier service he is predicting, Dalton said the airport eventually will need 1,800 spaces.

Patrick Henry currently has a 300-space parking lot that is used not only by the public but also by car rental services. The expansion will give Patrick Henry 600 public parking spaces and another 300 spaces for car rentals.

The low bid for the new lot came in at \$200,000, \$34,000 more than anticipated. Basic Construction Co. was the low bidder.
