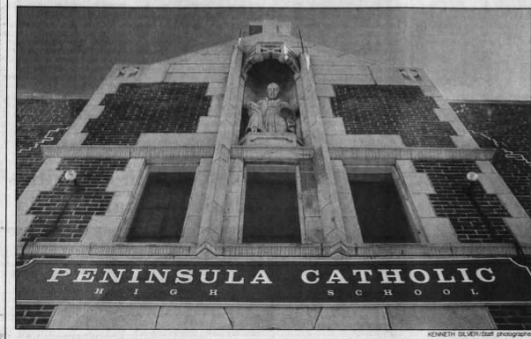
Site of proposed KW county landfill disputed

BY ASHLEA BALL EBERLING Staff Writer KING WILLIAM — An attorney representing a local landowner told county supervisors Thursday night they should consider the value of the Pamunkey River when they decide whether to allow Chesapeake Corp. to put a 50-acre landfill next to it.

Butcher in Richmond. "It is appropriate to put a landfill here against your most important resource, the Pamunkey River." At the public hearing before the Board of Supervisors, Chesapeake Corp. presented 24 slides with commentary from its West Point operations president, engineers and a geologist, while Bennett passed around an album of 24 photos prepared by his client, Eco Hill.

The Planning Commission held a public hearing in August and in September approved the company's application with seven conditions. The next step in the permit process is to receive approval from the supervisors. The Chesapeake presentation included detailed descriptions of the type of waste, the engineering process of the landfill and compliance with state regulations. The company's 25-minute allotted time was called, and the president of West Point operations, Fred Ernst, asked to give a brief summary.
