Seek Slayer Of Iowa Girl, 14

INVESTIGATORS are pressing their search today for clues in the slaying of Valerie Lynn Klumowicz, 14, of Waverly. The girl's partially clothed body was found Sunday morning by two boys under a creek bridge near here. The preliminary medical examination indicated the youngster had been strangled.

Asked if there was evidence of molesting, Louison said, "We're not going to say at the moment. More tests will have to be made." Valerie Lynn, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Klumowicz, had gone swimming at the municipal pool in her home town Sunday and was reported missing around 10 p.m. that day.

Investigators say they think the girl's body had been under the bridge since Sunday evening. The body was discovered in tall grass in a ditch near the creek. Sheriff Louison said his office has no firm leads. "We have some tentative leads but they have to be checked out," he added.

Find Cancer Origin 'Clue'

BERKELEY, Calif. (AP) — Two biochemists report they have discovered the specific chemical reaction by which a common cancer-causing agent — one found in cigarette smoke and other vapors — attacks living cells. They say it is a step toward understanding how cancer begins.

THE NEXT step in the three-year-old research will be an attempt to learn precisely what part of the cell's genetic structure is attacked, said Dr. Milton Calvin, a 1961 Nobel prize laureate.

Calvin has been awarded \$250,000 by the National Cancer Institute to pursue his experimentation. The findings of Calvin and Dr. Donald Cavallari at the University of California Lawrence Radiation Laboratory was described in current issue of "Proceedings of the National Academy of Science." Cavallari is now in research work at the University of Nebraska's Eggert Center in Omaha, Neb.

THE common cancer-causing agent studied by Calvin is the hydrocarbon called benzo(a)pyrene — B(a)P — which is a carcinogenic product of combustion. It is found in cigarette smoke, automobile exhausts, industrial smokestacks and other common combustion sources. Calvin and Cavallari learned that B(a)P attacks cells only in the presence of light, oxygen or both. Light or oxygen, they reported, cause an electrical substance in the B(a)P molecule to undergo rare reactions involving three points of the molecule's 12 points of activation.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Grumman Aircraft Corp. — money could be restored later this year if the Pentagon delivers a satisfactory solution to the F14's extension cost-overrun problem.
