

Bank hostages freed; robber slain by police

PARIS (AP) — Police freed North African bank hostages and captured the Spanish robber Thursday as they tried to escape after being shot at by police for 14 hours in a bank near the Eiffel Tower.

The Spanish robber and his partner had been held in the bank for 14 hours. Two women hostages in the car and all the hostages in the bank were unharmed. Police said the two gunmen, "arrived to the bank," used to rob a branch of the Credit Lyonnais shortly after 10:30 a.m. Wednesday, but were interrupted by guards from a bank delivery truck.

There was an exchange of shots, a robbery was in progress, the wounded, and the gunmen held members of the bank staff and customers near the basement safe deposit room.

The gunmen threatened to start shooting their hostages unless they were supplied with a private car and 12 million in 100 bills. Some like gunmen were held previously from within the bank.

Death penalty for Rosenberg known: Lawyer

By MARGARET GENTRY. WASHINGTON (AP) — Margaret Gentry, lawyer for Julius and Ethel Rosenberg, said today that a Justice Department lawyer told her the judge would impose the death penalty if Julius Rosenberg was convicted.

The lawyer's claim was described in a memo copied to more than 2000 judges in the United States. The document did not name the attorney, but previous documents have identified Jerome Epstein, a lawyer who worked with Rosenberg at the Federal House of Detention in New York and who led the FBI investigation from 1951 to 1953.

The presiding judge, Irving Kaufman, now a federal appeals court judge in New York, sentenced both to death. Despite widespread protests, the sentences were carried out in 1953.

The documents released last week by A. H. Belmont, then an assistant FBI director, on March 18, 1953, are the first to be declassified. According to the memo, the attorney reported that Rosenberg said his lawyers advised him he probably would be convicted and that he would probably be sentenced to a term of 30 years and that would be sentenced to 30 years.
