Authorities seek clues in slaying

OCEWIS—Law officers Thursday entered a freezing mist and chilling wind as they searched for clues in the slaying of a teen-ager in the Hazleton area.

Joe Holgate said the body was taken to Oelwein for an autopsy.
The road where the body was found is just west of the junction of Highway 190 and Highway 70, about 1 1/2 miles south of Oelwein.

Ul prof: Winter fling hazardous

IOWA CITY (AP) — A brief winter fling in Southern Iowa can be more hazardous to the health than a snow and sleet storm, a University of Iowa researcher claims.
"People with a heart condition, respiratory trouble or some other health problem are more likely to feel the effects of changing from a cold to a warm climate," warns Dr. Carl V. Gossli, an associate professor of physiology.

Girl vanished while waiting in car

Sheila Foley, whose body was found Wednesday on a dirt road near Oelwein, vanished the night of Dec. 2 while waiting in a car parked on Oelwein's main street.

There is no link between the two cases, Miss Bennett, a waitress at the Sir Laing in Waverly, vanished about 2 p.m. last week.
The missing girl had worked at the lounge since May, according to her mother, Mrs. Lowell Bennett of 211 S. Clarkville, Mrs. Bennett said for the past two months her daughter had been living with her grandmother, Mrs. Malita Bennett, in Waverly.

Elephant kills 9
DUMCO, Bangladesh (AP) — A wild elephant trampled nine persons to death and injured other 19 people Thursday night in two villages in Cox's Bazar, about 80 miles from Chittagong, Port, Bangladesh authorities reported Thursday.
Police said they were still hunting the killer elephant Thursday.

New truck getting Army's goat

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Army apparently is the goal in a \$100-million purchase of "Goat" amphibious trucks that are supposed to provide soldiers with transportation through water and over rough roads and generally primitive terrain, says Sen. William Proxmire, D-Mich.
The problem is, Proxmire said Wednesday, the trucks can't adjust to steep inclines, rough roads or high wind and if you try to maneuver them through the water they have a tendency to sink.

Waterloo policeman wins lawsuit

GUNDERSON was involved in a fight with Richard Greenlee, 40, of 1011 Birch Ave., and Leo Weichert, 26, of 208 S. Sixth St., according to testimony.
During the scuffle the officer was struck over the head and suffered a broken nose, rib and shoulder injuries which required surgery.
Gundersen told the jury he has recurring pain connected with the injuries. He said he received a trouble call at the club, 3211 W. Fourth St.
The two men later pleaded guilty to charges of assault with intent to do great bodily injury and resisting execution of process.

Andretta was asked by Freeman whether he wanted to remain in jail and testify. But Andretta simply refused his statement in open court.

SOFT OFFICIALS said Greenlee and Weichert had been found in default in the court. They did not respond to the suit.
Officials said Gundersen may seek a court hearing to assess the amount of damages the men may pay.
