

Police May Trim Investigation Of Auto Bombings

St. Louis County police officials will decide Monday whether to reduce the number of observers watching the investigation of three recent automobile bombings in South County.

Cap. E. J. Hauenstein says the decision will depend on whether the car and leads the warrant warrant possession of the hit cars.

"I don't know," says an investigator in the investigation and pull some of our people off if there isn't enough of a workload to keep them all busy," Hauenstein said Friday.

Three two-man teams, each made up of a sergeant from the district, Hauenstein and Firearms Bureau of the U. S. Treasury Department and a county police officer, have been working on the investigation since Nov. 3, when Shirley Marie Flynn, 21, a computer analyst, was killed when a gasoline bomb blew up her automobile as she was leaving for work. The car was parked outside her apartment in the 10th and Broadway area, near Interstate 44 and Highway 21 and Highway 94.

Mr. Flynn was the latest victim in a series of three auto bombings which began in South County on Oct. 15. Robert C. Jackson, 38, a supervisor at United

Parcel Service, was killed when his car was blown up in a South County parking lot at the Interlock apartment, Interstate 44 and Route 210, about a mile from the Flynn bombing.

A stock of dynamite reported to be in the parking lot at the Interlock apartment, between Lemay Ferry Road and Lindbergh Boulevard, the owner of the car, Ronald T. Strang, 32, was not named.

Police have been investigating whether the bombings were the work of a single person or several persons. The St. Louis County Board of Police Commissioners has ordered a \$200,000 reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of a suspect from the district.

More than 200 leads have been checked so far, but investigators have been advised because there seems to be no lead for the bombings and no connection between the three victims, Hauenstein said.

Hauenstein has said he believes the bomber to be a minority 30 person who has been known to frequent religious and social institutions and who have a history of working in their background. All days off have been cancelled for detectives working on the case, and the present pace of the investigation is expected to take at least six to eight weeks, Hauenstein said. "We've got to get it done in a matter of a few days, or we're not going to get it done," he said.

Hauenstein said some detectives involved in the investigation had been brought in from other county police agencies to help with the investigation. "There's nothing to be backing up on these other units," he said.

The department also faces a shopping bill for overtime pay for the investigation. Hauenstein said the cost had been figured out but he had not added. "We've got some money for our investigation. Investigation still have several leads to follow up on," he said.

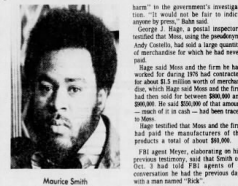
