

Campaign Workers Get Jobs in Shevin's Office

TALLAHASSEE — Atty. Gen. Robert Shevin found state jobs for six people who worked in his gubernatorial campaign, but forced other employees to take pay cuts to do it. Shevin employees continued yesterday to join the campaign and three others are joining the attorney general's staff for the first time.

The shells required three people who remained on Shevin's staff and to be demoted and a third to move to a new, but similar status job. Lane Wainwright Jr. returns to Shevin's staff as administrative assistant and administrative services director. Both jobs pay \$18,000 a year.

The changes include moving Charles Smith, who succeeded Wainwright, but for \$18,000 a year less, to director of Shevin's administrative law section. Ann Wainwright, Wainwright's wife, who succeeded Plank for about \$2,000 less, returns to her job as administrative assistant. She takes a \$150 a month pay cut.

Warren Henderson was demoted from administrative assistant II to II, so Mr. Wainwright could have her old job.

12-Year-Old Girl Burned to Death

PORT CHARLOTTE — A 12-year-old girl who sustained third degree burns from a short bicycle ride is being buried, a medical examiner said yesterday.

Flames fighting a blaze in a field Thursday found the body of Linda Plazette, 12, and investigators thought the girl was killed, then the field was alive to destroy the evidence.

But an autopsy yesterday discovered that "the cause of death was burning."

Said Dr. Peter Tan, associate medical examiner for Charlotte County, "He said he found out in the girl's lungs, indicating she was alive when she was buried."

Tan said the girl had not been sexually molested, and had no internal injuries or brain damage. Tests were being conducted to determine what was used to start the blaze.

A Lake Park man was killed last night when his motorcycle slammed into the rear end of a pickup truck that was stopped for a traffic light, a Florida Highway Patrol spokesman said.

Trooper J.C. Jacobs identified the man as David S. Krayer, 31, of 811 Evergreen Drive. Jacobs said the accident occurred at 513 at A.S. A.S. and Howard Road.

Jacobs estimated Krayer was traveling 40 to 50 mph, southbound on A.S. A.S. when he slammed into a truck driven by Wayne K. Soderber of 8177 Collier Drive, Lake Worth.

Krayer was dead on arrival at Palm Beach Gardens Community Hospital, Jacobs said. No charges were filed.

1 Killed, 2 Injured In 2-Truck Accident

A 60-year-old man was killed and his wife and daughter injured yesterday in a collision of Sandy Elm Road and 1230 Avenue N.E. at 4:15 a.m.

Charles B. Collins, of 12875 112nd St., died in Palm Beach Gardens Community Hospital shortly after the accident, according to Lt. James Kerney of the Palm Beach County Sheriff's north subdivision.

Kerney said the driver of the other vehicle, Lake Park police officer William Evans, 36, of 1285 Sandy Elm Road, was knocked unconscious and suffered facial cuts. He was treated at the hospital.

Collins' wife, Alma, 41, was in the front passenger seat of the hospital yesterday. Their 15-year-old daughter was in stable condition.
