### BCI to probe possible link in murders

A "possible correlation" between two recent murders in Waterloo and a pair of unsolved murders at Waverly in 1975 and 1976 is being investigated by the Iowa Bureau of Criminal Investigation.

Michael H. Moore, 23, of Waterloo, was held in lieu of \$1 million bond in a first-degree kidnapping charge in the abduction of one of the Waterloo victims.

No arrest has been made in the second Waterloo murder, and police have been keen on whether the two are connected.

But agent John Tucker of Cedar Falls said Thursday "we are aware of some possible correlations" between the Waterloo slayings and the Waverly murders of Linn Park and Julia Ann Manning.

The last one (the Kinn death), Tucker said, "the most obvious similarity is that she was taken to a remote area, taken out and dumped."

"We're certainly going to look into any correlation there may be. If nothing else, there's the location. We're only 15 miles from Waverly."

**Congressman hits canal treaties**  
WASHINGTON, D.C. (AP) — Representative George V. Brown (D-Iowa) is using a filibuster tactic filled with 40,000 simulated gold bricks to express his opposition to the new Panama Canal treaties.

He arrived on Capitol Hill Wednesday to denounce what Brown says is the \$4.1 billion cost to taxpayers of implementing the treaties.

### 'Recapture' tax bill passes House

Owners of lots zoned for residential property should have to pay an additional tax on that property, there is a change in its usage, the House floor decided Thursday.

The House overwhelmingly approved a proposal clarifying a 1977 law requiring a "recapture" property tax to be paid by owners of agricultural and residential property if usage changes.

The House approved the proposal on a 202-1 vote after it rejected an attempt to scuttle the entire property tax law proposal.

Since 1977, the Legislature has limited the amount of increase in taxable values on residential and agricultural property by placing a percent outside limit on taxable value growth.

Under the House proposal, property owners could be charged a recapture tax based on the actual market value of the property over a five-year period.

The bill would be determined by subtracting the actual amount of property tax paid by the owner from an amount based on the actual value of the property for the same period.

The proposal would not become fully effective until 1983.

Representative Charles Hanson (D-Mechanicsville), floor manager of the proposal, said the clarifying language will amend county and city assessors in dealing with a "major portion of the 1977 property tax law."

The proposal will give assessors the tools to make the determination of recapture taxes a lot easier, Hanson said.

However, opponents said the recapture tax provision is disliked by many assessors because many of them believe it is unworkable.

The recapture provision was the product of political expediency when the property taxes were debated in 1977. "It actually is unworkable, discriminatory and based on a false premise," said Representative Hugo Schenkels (D-Elkington).

### Wallace tells of promotions, staff changes

Des Moines Police Chief Billie B. Wallace announced two promotions and several staff changes Thursday.

Wallace also named Lt. P.V. Curran to replace Neen in the youth section. Curran had been assigned to inspective services.

Wallace also said Lt. Ronald Dabb and Lt. William Tighe will switch positions. Dabb leaves the prosecution section of the criminal investigation division for inspective services and Tighe moves over to the prosecution section.

And Sgt. Dale Anderson will be moved from the administrative services division to the uniform division and Sgt. Dennis H. Juss from the uniform division to the administrative services division, Wallace added.

The changes are effective Monday, Wallace said.
