"I learned that back then he installed sprinkler systems. So I began waiting to see how he got on. I found a house with a sprinkler system just three doors away. I asked, and found out his company installed it. . . I called the company and found out he did the installation just three weeks before the murder."

Reilly confirmed that Barton was taken off a second assignment from McDougall, another old, unassigned murder case that he was ordered to bring all his files to the sheriff's department, supply the department with a copy of his report on the Pikaritz case and work out of the detective squad room "like everybody else."

"Our detectives work 8 1/2 cases a month; we can't afford to let one work on a single case full time," he said.

The Pikaritz case already was two years old when Sapp took office, and although he had not given up on it, as evidenced by his having Gandy resubmit evidence to a lab and follow up on a potential lead, Reilly conceded its priority had fallen by 1985.

But he was not reluctant to say he had no fondness for assigning a detective to a single case. "It can give you tunnel vision; you tend to focus in on one person, skip considerate factors that might suggest innocence," he said. Reilly, his chief deputy, said that if Barton was "thrown out," it was not by the sheriff or any of Barton's superiors. "It was his fellow officers. He had an attitude problem."

"Ever hear of 'what goes around, comes around'?" Reilly says. "That you shouldn't act nasty to people on your way out because you never know who you might find yourself working with on the way back down?"

"Well, so, he wasn't in the dog house for solving the Pikaritz case, certainly, that's ludicrous."

Barton said he was not assigned a new case for nearly two months, so he quit. "I love to work. They probably knew that was the worst thing they could do to me."

could respond more quickly to calls. Barton said he and his wife, Iliad Englewood, too much to move so he resigned.

"It's a shame," the prosecutor said. "He did an excellent job on the Pikaritz case, thorough. Metcalf. . . It's made as good a case as can be made, considering how long it took to make."

Says Paul Pikaritz: "It was all out there. It's just no one talked to all those folks; no one knew how to pull it together except Kenney. I think what happened to Sapp, McDougall taking over for a short time, it was all out of God's hand."

McDougall thinks so, too. "I do think God used me. It's an instrument. . . And I believe that what happened to him is a cross that will be righted some day."

And Barton does not discourage talk of his raising for sheriff against Sapp next year, although he doesn't promote it either. There are at least three candidates in that field already.
