State will give Megabucks winners investment choice

The Oregon Lottery next month will start giving Megabucks players a choice of receiving jackpot prizes in a lump sum instead of annual payments.

The Lottery Commission adopted the change Wednesday along with adding options to give Megabucks players a chance at

larger payouts for the secondary prizes.

In the Megabucks game, players must match all six numbers drawn to win the top prize. The minimum jackpot prize is \$1 million and there are two co-winners a week.

The lottery now pays the jackpot prize in 20 yearly payments, with withholding for federal income taxes. The lottery uses money amounting to about half the total jackpot amount to fund an annuity fund, with earnings will pay out the jackpot prize total during 20 years.

Starting Aug. 5, players will be

able to pick a new "investor's choice" option instead of the original payout method.

Under that choice, the winner's prize will be one-half the jackpot amount paid in a lump sum. The winner will be free to do the investing, instead of the lottery doing it.

tion, Douglas, Jefferson and Marion counties and the U.S. Forest Service.

The area, which is between Big Lake and Clear Lake, was chosen because roads had little recreation and forested areas there where Rachuda was last seen.

Jerry Martin, a Marion County search and rescue worker, said the area being searched was based on a report he had received from a woman who is now 30 years old.

The terrain in the area is dense and close to the ground, which makes searching difficult, he said.

Martin said the number of Marion County search and rescue workers would be scaled back today.

"We have to be looking for the person in Marion County and Marion County," he said. "This has been a busy month, but search teams have been limited."

Martin said much of the area being searched is used for timber and has many roads.

"The areas that are more populated with roads are going to take longer," he said.

Because the roads were built for logging, most are narrow and trees would complicate the search near roads, he said.

Rachuda has been wearing a white T-shirt with New Kids on the Block on the front and black, black and white, high-top LA Gear tennis shoes.

She is 4 feet, 8 inches tall, weighs 87 pounds and has curly, shoulder-length, dark brown hair and brown eyes.

The ground search will continue today, Martin said. Lane County Sheriff helicopters may continue an aerial search, he said.

Nighttime temperatures have been in the 30s and 40s, but conditions here have deteriorated, Martin said.

"There's cover. There is water up there and food, but it's not the kind of food you can survive on for very long."

"They're getting really tired. Most of those people, you keep going because you wouldn't see it out of your children."

In addition to the search, authorities are checking reports that have placed Rachuda as far north as the Portland area, Martin said. But none of those reports has been verified.

"We get those calls. Whenever we run a photograph we get calls. So to check them out. So far, we haven't found any that appear to be bona fide sightings," he said.

Kopetski filed similar charges against Smith in September, but the House Ethics Committee rejected his complaint a week later.

Kopetski complained that Smith had improperly listed his office phone numbers in a letter to campaign contributors.

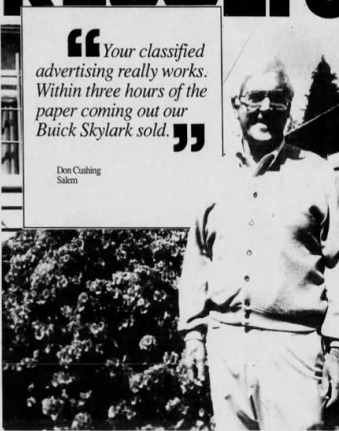
