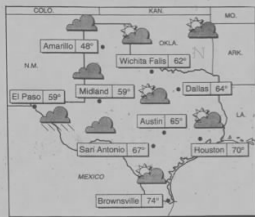

New Mexico lawmen see links to Austin slayings

LAS CRUCES, N.M. (AP) — Police said Monday they are looking into the Austin, Texas slayings of four teenage girls in a yogurt shop for possible connections to the 1990 Las Cruces bombing alley massacre that left four dead.

Capt. Fred Rubio said a detective from the Las Cruces Police Department told Texas officials on Monday about last year's slayings.

Four teen-age girls, ranging in age from 13 to 17, were shot twice in the back of the head. They were discovered shortly after midnight Friday by firefighters putting out a blaze at the yogurt shop where two of the girls worked.

The victims were Jennifer Harrison, 17, her sister, Sarah Harrison, 15, Elita Thomas, 17, and Amy Ayers, 13, authorities said. Two of the girls worked at the shop.

The case has striking similarities to the Feb. 10, 1990, Las Cruces shootings that remain unsolved.

In the New Mexico slayings, two men robbed Las Cruces Bowlers of \$5,000 and shot all the witnesses in the back of the head. The robbers set a blaze to cover up the crime, but one of the victims was able to call for help.

The victims in that shooting were Paula Holguin, 6, her sister, Valerie Torres, 2, and Amy Houser, 13.

Insurance 'horror stories'

Fair treatment: Gov. Richards says federal regulation may be needed.

HOUSTON (AP) — Segments of the insurance industry have used lawsuits and other maneuvers to defeat state efforts to make companies treat their customers fairly, says Gov. Ann Richards.

Richards told state insurance regulators Monday that the insurance industry often seems to want to deal "only on its own terms" and "prefers obstruction to change."

She said it has reached the point where the federal government may have to regulate insurance.

"The need for reform has increased since last year, and I greatly fear that the states' ability to regulate may be usurped by a national crisis," she said.

Among the governor's "horror stories" was one of a man who said the State Board of Insurance that after he developed a heart condition his monthly insurance premium climbed in six years from \$214 to \$1,797.

Richards said she is "really shocked by the number of companies who ask to come visit with me personally — and they do — who say they want to be part of the solution, who sit in on all the negotiations for legislative reform, then leave the table and head straight to the courthouse or the direct mail routes to cry wolf at the top of their lungs."

"From our point of view, it often seems like an industry that wants to deal only on its terms, that prefers obstruction to change, that doesn't want to understand that we share a mutual responsibility to the same people, to the ones who pay taxes and premiums," the governor said. "There is no white hat, black hat, but good guy in the business of insurance regulation."

"There are the families who lost their premiums and their coverage when their insurers went under, the people who lost coverage because they make a claim, the elderly who are cheated out of their money by worthless Medicare policies," said Richards.

Hit-and-run kills 'good samaritan'

TO HELP a motorist just stalled car off a freeway was struck and killed by a hit-and-run driver, police said. The victim was identified as Andrew Whetzel, 25, of Dallas. Officers said Whetzel stopped to get Donald Johnson, 28, of Dallas, who was attempting to push his stalled car off the expressway Sunday night. Whetzel was struck by a fast-moving car struck both Whetzel and his pickup truck.

Judge OKs redistricting

AUSTIN (AP) — A newly-approved House redistricting plan is ready for U.S. Justice Department officials to review even though state and federal judges will likely hear other challenges of Texas voting boundaries.

A compromise plan, agreed upon by lawmakers and minority rights groups, was accepted Monday by a state district judge. The House map will probably be forwarded to Justice Department officials for review today, said Gray McBride, a spokesman for state Attorney General Dan Morales.

The revised House map creates 25 House districts, five more than one that earlier was invalidated by the Justice Department, said Jim Harrington of the Texas Civil Rights Project, representing some plaintiffs in the Edinburg lawsuit that sparked the compromise.

The plaintiffs and House leaders worked on the plan late Monday afternoon. The agreement was supported by 77 of the 150 House members, including House Speaker Gib Lewis.

Judge Mario E. Ramirez approved the plan following a brief hearing in Edinburg.

Now the settlement is expected to be presented today to a three-judge federal panel.
