Insurance board freezes benchmark for automobile rates

AUSTIN (AP) — Members of the State Board of Insurance said the new policy they ratified for automobile insurance rates should help both buyers and insurers.

The board voted unanimously Monday to freeze current benchmark rates for automobile policyholders and allow insurers to charge within a range of 25 percent above or 30 percent below that standard.

Officials said that with the wide range of possible premiums, consumers should find out their rate classification and look for the best deal.

"We're going to be watching what's happening in the marketplace very closely," said board member Alvin Everts. "If we have to move to protect the consumer, that's what we'll do."

Ex-Bear official sentenced

AUSTIN (AP) — A former Bear County election administrator has been sentenced to serve jail time and probation in connection with felony and misdemeanor charges against him.

Marzo "Tony" Gomez, who resigned last April from his election administrator post, was sentenced Monday by state District Judge John Wister in Travis County.

Gomez had pleaded his contest last month to securing execution of documents by deception, a felony, and tampering with government records, a misdemeanor.

The judge ordered Gomez to serve 10 years' probation, pay a \$2,000 fine, complete 300 hours of community service and pay more than \$49,000 in restitution for the felony charge. Gomez paid \$24,000 in restitution Monday.

For the misdemeanor, the judge ordered Gomez to serve 90 days in the Travis County Jail, which would be allowed to serve on weekends. Gomez remained free on bond.

The case was filed in Austin by the public integrity unit of the Travis County District Attorney's Office. Last May, after Gomez resigned, officials with the Secretary of State's Office began investigating missing state money that had been designated for paying poll workers in Bear County.

The charges against Gomez were filed later.
